


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The Abdelatif's Family

Osama, born in Cairo, Egypt, and Rory Mac Ewing, from San Diego, CA, met at the American University in Cairo (AUC) in 1978, while they were students. Although they were the first persons in either family to marry a foreigner, the young couple was enthusiastically welcomed into the family at their wedding in Cairo in 1983.

Osama's parents, Anwar and Kout el-Quloub, from Cairo, have three children.

Now retired, Anwar was the Undersecretary in the Egyptian Government's Ministry of Housing and the foremost expert on cement production in his country. Osama's older brother, Abdelatif, is an engineer and architect. His younger sister, Muna, studied journalism at Cairo University.

After completing high school, Osama realized one of his 3 lifelong dreams which

included: becoming a professional soccer player, a world class pigeon racer, or a physician. Luckily, for all of us, Osama was accepted into the Cairo University, School of Medicine in 1976. For many years, Osama also wanted to study in another country. Halfway through medical school, he applied and received a scholarship from the International Rotary Foundation to study English and one year of pathology. 

medical degree and was inducted into the Egyptian Army, where he served 15 months as a physician.












I AM A GARDEN

You probably heard the stories about how much fun it could be to visit Lebanon. All the things you can do while on a visit; to mention a few, the nightlife, the restaurants, the cafés, the beach resorts, concerts, etc....

I want to talk about something you haven't heard much about probably "Hiking". Lebanon's rugged environment and natural beauty create breathtaking and unlimited hiking trails. These trails often pass through luscious greenery, brooks, historical sites, and villages making any hike an enjoyable cultural expedition. Hiking is a unique way to experience the people, traditions and the villages of Lebanon. You have few options when it comes to hiking. You can put together your own hike with friends and family or you can join a hiking club as a guest. There are two major hiking clubs "Lebanon trek" and "club de vieux sentier". I recommend trying both, each tend to have there own unique hikes.

Hiking levels vary between easy to advanced. The beginner level are great if you are short on time or just want to enjoy a walk in nature. The advanced ones tend to take more time, require a little bit more expertise and gear. A third option if you feel adventurous and want to visit remote areas, would be the overnight hikes

where more packing is required and mule help bringing in supply might be necessary.

Enjoy your time and experience Lebanon like you never seen it before.

Some recommended hikes:

Ehden Reserve is situated on the upper northwestern slopes of Mount Lebanon, ranging in altitude from 1200m to 2000m. The temperature ranges between -2C in winter and 25C in sum-





mer. The Reserve is home to more than 500 species of flowering plants, of which 57 are endemic to Lebanon or only to this forest. This fact makes it the only natural site with such a variety of plants like *Diantus Karami*, and *Astragalus Ehdenensis*. Many trails of various levels are possible to hike in the reserve. Hikers

can take the footpath that leads them to the upper reaches of the reserve where they can admire the breathtaking scenery and spectacular views.



The Shouf Reserve is a unique landscape covered with cedar, oak and pine forests.

The protected area is located at the southernmost limit of the Cedar of Lebanon on the globe, and claims the highest self-regenerating stand of cedars in the Lebanon. It is exceptionally rich in its biological diversity and is known to be the last

remaining sanctuary to shelter an extensive range of wildlife species in the country.

The Nahr Ibrahim valley offers a varied landscape and is considered one of the most enchanting for hiking. The impression is almost surrealistic as one makes his way down the valley toward the river bank. Perhaps the Namroud hill and Wadi Jabal Moussa are the most attractive spots which are covered by oak forests. The forests extend to the valley below and reveal a rich biodiversity boasting well over 35 kinds of trees and flora

Club de Vieux Sentiers (Old Trails Club).

This is a popular hiking group that has been around for a while. Their hikes have covered various areas of Lebanon, including Qornet el-Sawda (the highest point of Lebanon), remote mountains in far-north Lebanon (Akkar region), the Shouf, and high mountains above Hasroun, Laklouk, and Faraya.
