










































The Rise of Empires 2300-2000 BC

The basic family structure remains the same, 2-3 children was the average. Breastfeeding lasted as long as 3 years as a method of contraception. Older brothers and maternal uncles were in leading the family. Monogamy was the norm except for kings and

other rich men who had polygamous families. **King Suli** had 9 wives. All children were legitimate. Women occasionally reached high status, but usually because of the influence of their brothers or father. The most powerful of the royal ladies was **Enheduana**, the first occupant of the post of high priestess of the moon god at Ur and the goddess of love and war at Uruk. She is considered the first female poet in the world. Women could testify in court. Daughters did not inherit if there were sons, but they received gifts from the estates. Widow could inherit some assets. Administrators heavily exploited lower class women, especially when they were helpless. Working women received lower pay than men. There was no established welfare system for widows and orphans, women and children were dedicated to be employed in weaving and processing wool.

Governors were chosen from among the local worthies, but generals that accompanied them were definitely creatures of the king. Royal officials were the ultimate controllers of the public institutions of their cities. The officials had an impact on the economy in many ways. One presumably got to become an official mainly through inheritance; many officials were able to pass on their posts to their sons. This led inevitably to a lack of flexibility in the bureaucracy and eventually limited the kings' power over their supposed servants. This was one important cause of the breakdowns in the imperial system.






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Take a trip with me to my Beirut


with dramatic mountains rising behind it. A city with a venerable past, 5,000 years ago Beirut was a prosperous town on the Canaanite and Phoenician coast.

Historical Heritage

Beirut stands on the site of a very ancient settlement going back at least 5,000 years. Its name appeared in cuneiform inscriptions as early as the 14th century B.C. In the first century B.C., Berytus, as it was then called, became a Roman Colony and under Roman rule was the seat of a famous Law school which continued into the Byzantine era.

But the power and the glory of Berytus were destroyed by a triple catastrophe of earthquake, tidal wave and fire in 551 A.D. In the following century Arab Muslim forces took the city and in 1110 it fell into the Crusaders. Bei-

rut remained in Crusader hands until 1291 when it was conquered by the Mamlukes. Ottoman rule began in 1516, continuing for 400 years later until the defeat of the Turks in World War I. The French Mandate Period followed and in 1943 Lebanon gained its independence.



Often compared to the likes of Ibiza and New York City in terms of its social scene, Beirut and its people exhibit an overwhelming thirst for life that is rarely witnessed elsewhere. Perhaps most unique to this city is the endless options to choose from within the social scene as well as the fact that every night is comparable to a Saturday night.

With an endless venue of trendy places to select from, it inevitably comes down to the individual's own personal taste and mood that will determine his or her night. Those hoping to participate in the city's supreme nightlife experience may ultimately hit Beirut's famous hot spots such as Monnot Street, Downtown Beirut, Ain el Mreisseh, or even Sodeco.

Evening activities often begin in the local pubs and restaurants whereby those wishing to enjoy a great selection of music to sing and dance to will head to Zinc, Red, or Lila Braun while those wishing to enjoy a more relaxing evening comp-lete with the largest and best selection of concoc-ted drinks in town will stop by Pacifico, Centrale, or Bar Louie. For those hoping to enjoy the best and most mouth-watering food in the city, Salmontini, famous for its delicious freshly made salmon, remains an obvious choice. Furthermore, a must-see spot for anyone seeking a more unique nighttime experience would be to head over to Sky Bar where friends can enjoy the exquisite cuisine and drinks while lounging under the city's starry sky.

However, this is not to say that typical Lebanese nights end early, for those desiring to continue the evening dancing and clubbing to some of the best music and DJ's in town will head over to Crystal or BO-18 to enjoy a combination of class and a dance-like atmosphere that will guarantee visitors the ultimate clubbing experience.

In addition to the clubbing scene it comes as very little surprise that one of the most guaranteed fun spots remains <u>Casino du Liban</u>. Directed towards an older crowd, the

recently built casino guarantees all visitors an incredible time often compared to the likes of the Vegas scene.

With this in mind, all party-goers are recommended to go out and be part of a nightlife scene that has Beirut coined as the party city of the Middle East.

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
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
